CLUB HIGHLIGHTS



President's Message

It is my pleasure to present this annual report as President of the Auckland University Cricket Club in its 113th year.

On the back of the Level 4 lockdown at the end of last season, the Club continued to have to deal with the impact of Covid during the 20/21 season. Auckland moved to Level 3 protocols in August 2020 and twice in February 2021, which meant no cricket was able to be played. While Auckland was at Level 2, cricket practices and matches were able to take place but with social and physical distancing protocols and measures put in place. I want to thank our members for their understanding and cooperation and commend our Board and Management team for the way they prepared and conducted the Clubs affairs during these challenging times.

This season the Board has been chaired by Matt Taylor. I would like to thank Matt for his stewardship along with the rest of the Board for all the work they have done over the past season and particularly acknowledge the two board members that will not be seeking re-election this AGM, Darryl Hari and Damien Poppelwell. Darryl has invested most of his time focussed on youth cricket and EDCA matters with the aim of keeping our college players engaged with cricket and playing at or representing the Club where possible.

He has and will continue to be involved with the provision of electrical services work for the Indoor Training Facility (ITF) development. Damien since stepping down as Junior Chairman has provided valuable input around the Board table and also driven the recent bar refurbishment with Ketan Patel and helped arrange the security, booking and IT components of the ITF project. He has been our go to man when it comes to information technology. We are very grateful for all their efforts over the past years and the significant difference they have made to the Club.

On the ITF development, we revised the design, primarily removing the mezzanine viewing facility and we believe we have sufficient funds to permit us to start the project on receipt of the approval of the Council as landlord. Because of the changes made to the design (despite it primarily involving removal of work) the Council will not permit us to commence the project without receiving the amendment to building consent that we earlier obtained (from another division of Council). Changes to the structural engineers' report, the fire report and revised architectural plans and costings and getting Council's revised approvals have all taken longer than expected. This has meant that we aren't likely to commence the build till early August. While it is disappointing we are not on track to have the facility up and running for pre-season practices, we remain on track to deliver the facility this calendar year with the revised goal of having it ready for use around the beginning of the playing season. Although the mezzanine floor has been removed for this stage, we hope to add this feature to the facility at some time in future.

With a focus on facilities, I would like to thank all the members and sponsors who have contributed to the funding and upgrade and patronage of the new bar. In particular, I would like to thank Ketan, Damien, Glenn Keeley of Cavalry Marketing & Design and Anthony Belk of Speedy Signs Newmarket who have all made significant contributions to enable completion of the

project – it has been a sea change for the clubrooms with respect to the quality of the facility and the impact it has had socially at the Club.

Another highlight was the way so many heard the call to arms and fronted up at the beginning of the season for Ground Force day. This was an initiative led by Ketan, where volunteers turned up to help prepare the facilities for the start of the season and completed such tasks as uplifting the old carpet in the bar area, cleaning the clubrooms, painting the clubrooms, fixing the covers and nets, and making up junior gear bags. A big thank you to all those who volunteered their time. As they say “many hands make light work”.

With respect to our membership and playing numbers this season, the Club totalled 1041, primarily made up of 670 juniors including 83 junior girls. This was slightly down (by 1%) on last season's participation. We remain the 2nd largest club in Auckland behind Cornwall.

I want to take the opportunity to congratulate all players from the Club selected for national, Auckland, first-class and EDCA honours. However, I would like to make special mention of those senior players recognised at the Auckland Cricket Awards, namely Jesse Prasad for Hearts Bowler of the Year and the Anna Peterson and Holly Huddleston who were both recognised for playing 100 matches for the Hearts.



On the field our Senior Premier teams were solid. Our Premier Men's team have retained their top eight status for next season finishing 6th in the Hedley Howarth 2 Day Championship, 6th in their pool in the Jeff Crowe Cup for the Limited Overs Championship and 6th in their pool for the T20 Championship. It was the youngest team I can remember in my 15 years at the Club, and so the future looks very bright for this team. While our Premier Women's team didn't collect the silverware they had in previous seasons, they were regularly without their more experienced players that were away with representative commitments.

Despite that they achieved consistent results finishing 5th in both the Prichard Cup Limited Overs Championship and the Pearl Dawson Trophy T20 Championship. The respective Club Captain Reports contain further details of the various team results and their performances. I hope everyone who played cricket at the Club, irrespective of the grade and their performance, had an enjoyable season. As a Club we want to provide a game for all and a game for life.

I am pleased to report that the Club is in a healthy financial position and the details are fully outlined in the annual Financial Statements and our Treasurer's extensive report. I would like to thank David Curtis for the tremendous work he has done especially in raising the level of reporting and the work required in with the adoption the Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit). I would also like to thank David and especially Wendy Verry for the work they have put in producing our grant funding applications and the additional work required in respect of the ITF funding applications.

Junior Club Report

It was with a degree of trepidation that we started the 2020/2021 season. The 2019/20 season abruptly ended due to Covid pandemic sporting restrictions. We saw winter sports clubs struggle to run a meaningful season due to the lockdowns. As our pre-season commenced, the second Covid lockdown in August 2020 saw us having to cancel pre-season academy sessions, and gave us a taste of what it might be like to run a season under stop / start conditions. We were uncertain as to whether we would be able to retain members.

With that as our starting point, I am very pleased to say that we had a very successful season in the junior club. We had 670 players this season, slightly down on last season. Whilst one playing weekend was lost to the short Covid lockdown in February, good weather on Friday nights and Saturdays saw minimal game cancellations.

Last year's report highlighted the benefits of the "Age & Stage" format in retaining junior players. With another year of this format completed, it is clear that this approach is beneficial in player's enjoyment of the sport, and therefore their ongoing involvement in cricket, and our club. Coaches, scorers and umpires also enjoyed minimal rule changes compared to previous years which was pleasing.

A key focus in the junior club is bringing new players into the sport. This season, our Year 0/1 Friday night skills program had around 100 boys and girls participating. Parent feedback was very positive, and it was great to see the kids having fun and developing their skills. A big thanks to our club coaches who delivered this program. It's a challenging age to work with – but our coaches always approached it with a great attitude and skill. The revitalised bar facilities provided our junior families with an improved clubrooms experience for Friday evening cricket. Our goal is to continue to increase the feeling of club community and belonging and we will identify further improvements to attract teams and families to socialise before or after their games.



A notable challenge this season was ground conditions and availability. Most frustrating and visible were the ground conditions on B, C, and D blocks. We were prevented from using B block for our Year 0/1 program, and had to work hard to keep Y2 – Y4 games on this ground. Poor maintenance on C and D block saw the ground rapidly deteriorate to the point where it was almost unplayable. It is very important for the junior club to have games as close to the clubrooms as possible on a Friday night to encourage teams to return to the clubrooms after their games. For hardball grades and midweek teams, ground availability was also a challenge in varying ways. Late draws, overlapping fields, and scheduling issues caused a degree of frustration for some teams. Hopefully next season is an improved situation for all.

On the coaching front, we had some successes and some areas for improvement. As noted above, the Y0/1 programme was very successful, as were the coaching visits for Y2 – Y4 for those teams who engaged. We will look at ways to ensure increased coverage in the season ahead. Friday night hardball training was well received by those who attended, but attendance was mixed across grades and teams. We will review how we are delivering this to see if we can increase attendance for what is a valuable part of the junior offering.

We continue to wait patiently for the delivery of the indoor training facility. It will be a major asset for the junior club, and will also help relieve ground pressures by increasing overall training net capacity. Our pre-season and school holiday training would also greatly benefit from the ITF. At present we are reliant on external indoor nets for these courses and these are not always readily available and cost us money to hire.

On the competitions front, some items of note:

- Club of Origin saw three U13 teams and two U15 participate. AUCC performed well – with the U13A team beating their arch-rivals Parnell.
- JT Sparling Super Series was well represented by AUCC teams across all grades; however, we were less successful than in previous seasons coming third overall.
- Healthy representation and good performances by our girls in EDCA teams in the District Tournament.
- 6 teams attended the Hawkes Bay Cricket tournament over the summer holidays.

Regarding the JT Sparling Super Series and the Cavalry Junior Blues programme, we intend to review our approach to this for the season ahead. We are seeing clubs struggle to field enough teams in some year levels. This is impacting our ability to deliver cricket games to some of our teams. We also are reconsidering what our approach should be to the intent of the programme in light of the “Age and Stage” format changes and the overall trend to decrease competitive elements in children’s sport. There is a balance to be met, and we need to do some work next season to ensure we have the balance right for our players.

In my first season as JCC, I am very grateful for the support I have received in getting up to speed in the role. In particular I would like to thank Ketan Patel, our Club Operations Manager, who has guided and supported me throughout the season. Ketan has displayed unfailing enthusiasm for championing improvements across the junior club and ensuring our members get a great club experience.

I’d also like to thank some other individuals. Shane Goonasekera, our Junior Coaching Coordinator, for his passion to develop both our junior crickets and our volunteer coaches. Wendy Verry, for managing our funding and administration; as well as organising school visits and school competitions.

There’s a lot of work involved in coordinating the activities of so many members. So, a big thanks to our grade convenors: Brent Lindenberg, Sean Thompson, Nicola Matthews, Cindy Duggan, Michelle Tsui, David Aitkenhead, Jason Darrow, and Darryl Hari for carrying out these critical roles.

I look forward to another great season of cricket in 2021 / 2022. Cricket takes a lot of effort to make happen, so a final thanks to our army of volunteers – coaches, managers, umpires, scorers and supporters. You make our club a great place to play cricket, and we are very grateful for your support.

Financial Report

The Board of Management is pleased to present the financial statements for the financial year ended 30 April 2021. These have been audited and an unqualified audit report received from our auditor, Graeme Lynch.

The 2020/21 season was challenging to manage, with the Covid pandemic resulting in the cancellation of some pre-season coaching, limitations in grant funding and the lockdown of the club rooms at times over the summer. This resulted in a loss of income from some sources, such as reduced pre-season coaching revenue. The Board and Management worked hard to secure alternative funding and sponsorship, as well as manage costs, in order to preserve the financial resources of the Club. It is pleasing to note that with the support of foundations, sponsors and members, the Club is in a healthy financial position.

Accounting Policy

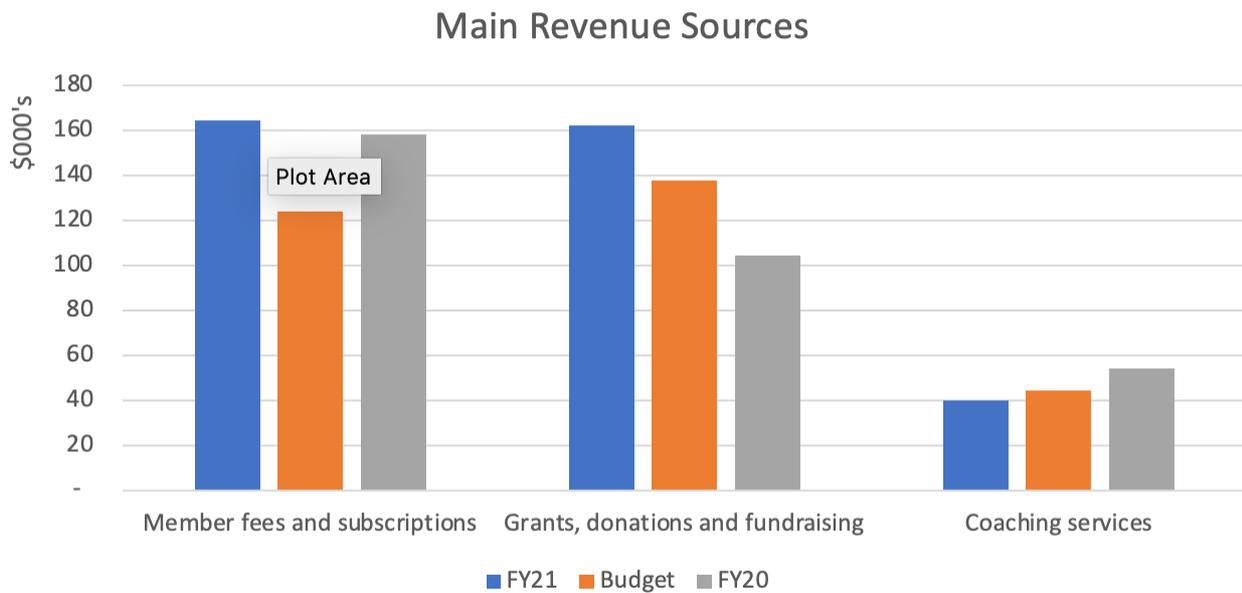
The Club elected to adopt PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) for the first time in this reporting period. This resulted in accounting policy changes, including the transfer of the Deferred Income balance of \$118,604, representing funds raised for the Indoor Training Facility (ITF) project, directly to reserves, along with a \$20,000 provision established for external net repair.

Financial Performance

The Club generated an overall surplus of \$86,925 for the period, compared to a surplus of \$13,051 in the previous period. The most significant reasons for this additional surplus were due to successful fundraising efforts and increased income from sponsors, a material portion of which was spent on the Bar & Café refurbishment, and temporary cost savings.

Income

This financial year the Club derived total revenue of \$379,599 (2020: \$320,557), comprising member fees and subscriptions, grants, donations and funding activities, coaching income, interest income and bar/café surplus. The three main sources of revenue are displayed in the following graph, as compared with the budget and prior year.



Despite the impact of the pandemic, we were able to increase member numbers and subscription revenue. We were fortunate that the pandemic caused minimal disruption to the number of playing days and are grateful for the patience of all members during the season.

Although grant funding from traditional sources was down, we were able to access \$22.7k (excl. GST) from a Government funded resilience fund for amateur sports clubs. Through focused and disciplined efforts, we were able to more than double sponsorship income this year to \$40k (2020: \$18k), as well as conduct a very successful fundraising raffle generating \$17k of revenue. Together, this resulted in a 55% increase in revenue from grants, donations, sponsors and fundraising. We could not achieve this without the generous support of our sponsors and members.

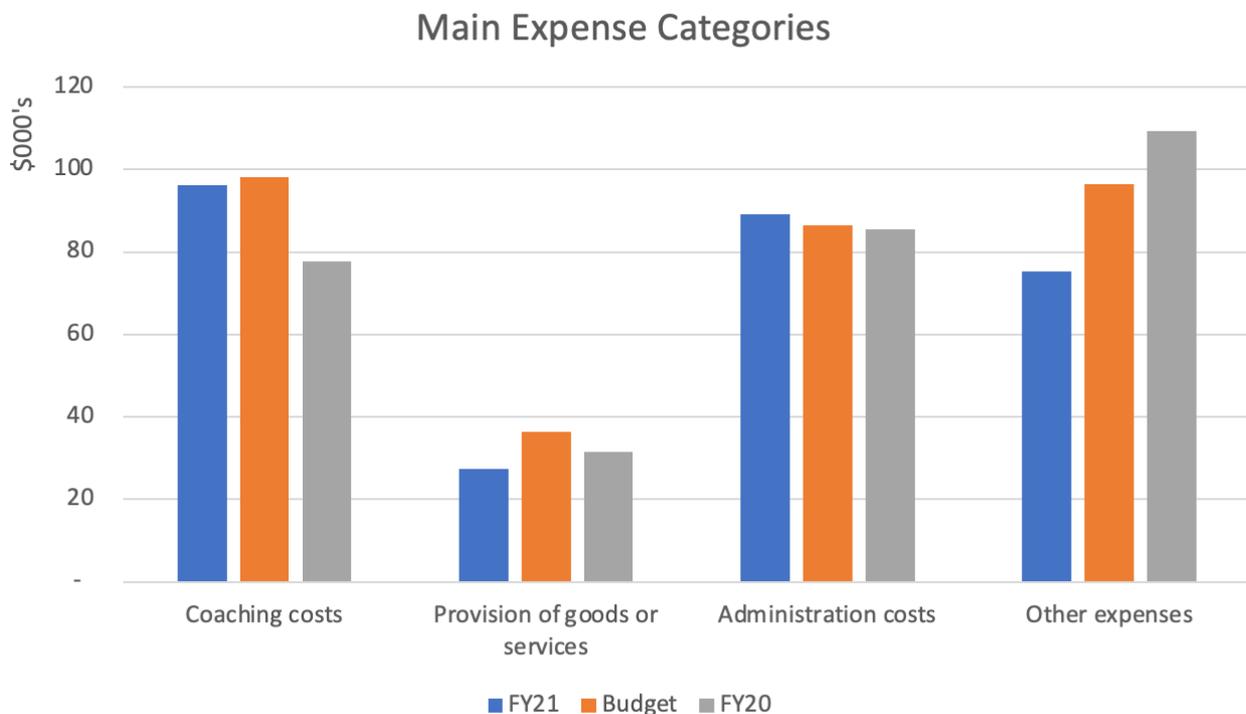
Although pre-season coaching program income was down more than 35%, other service based income, such as the annual JTS tournament, was consistent with prior years, resulting in a net reduction overall of around 25%.

Despite some interruption from the pandemic, and some staffing issues, we were able to increase gross revenue from the Bar and Café by more than 65% to \$71.5k (2020: 43.3k), resulting in a surplus of \$5.9k, compared with a deficit of \$4k in the prior season. More than \$26k was spent on upgrading the bar area to create an enhanced atmosphere. A large portion of this cost was covered by our generous sponsors, Cavalry Marketing & Design and Speedy Signs Newmarket, which we all owe a huge thanks. I would also like to thank our Club Manager, Ketan Patel, who has done an outstanding job managing the transformation and generating increased activity in the clubrooms.

Interest income continues to decline as term investments mature from their previously locked in higher interest rates. As a large portion of our funds are committed to the ITF project, which we expect to start shortly, we have not been reinvesting the funds in term investments. Accordingly, we do not anticipate deriving much interest income in future periods.

Expenditure

The Club incurred total expenditure of \$290,082 (2020: \$307,296), comprising coaching costs, administration costs, costs associated with providing paid coaching services and other expenditure, such as ACA fees, gear and ball costs and prizegiving costs. A more complete breakdown of expenditure is provided in the financial statements. The four main cost categories are displayed in the following graph, as compared with the budget and prior year.



Coaching costs were broadly in line with budget, and increased 24% over the previous year. Deploying funds on coaching remains a key priority of the Board. Costs incurred providing paid coaching services were down, due mainly to cancelled pre-season coaching programs as a result of the pandemic. Administration costs were broadly in line with budget and the previous season.

Other expenses were down more than 30% on the previous year. This was mainly due to reduced indoor net hire costs, as a result of cancelled pre-season programs, reduced gear expenditure and repairs and maintenance. We would expect these costs to increase next year to be more in line with this year's budget.

The depreciation total of \$2,592 (2020: \$200) is inflated by the depreciation of the Bar and Café fitout. Depreciation is a non-cash expenditure item and reflects the deterioration in value of assets over time. The increase in depreciation this year reflects the recent investment in Bar and Café. We have established a \$26,000 capital reserve to fund the depreciation and future cost of replacing this asset.

Financial Position

The Club is in a healthy position, with total accumulated funds of \$461,394 (2020: \$235,865) and cash reserves, including term investments, of \$481,742 (2020: \$329,845). The majority of the increase of \$225,529 in accumulated funds arose from the change in accounting policy noted above, which resulted in \$138,604 being transferred directly from other liabilities to reserves, the difference being from the surplus of \$86,925.

The Board has set aside a number of reserves to cover future known expenditure. This includes a \$20,000 capital reserve to cover external net repair costs, a \$26,000 capital reserve to fund the depreciation relating to the Bar and Café refurbishment, a \$70,000 operational contingency reserve and a \$293,604 reserve in respect of funds committed to the ITF project. An additional \$85,000 received from community trusts for the ITF have been recorded as liabilities, due to the condition that they must be used for the ITF or returned to the funder.

The purpose of the \$70,000 operational contingency reserve is specifically to ensure that the Club has an emergency fund equivalent to at least six months fixed operating cost, should current operational grant funding be lost or diminished.

Assets

In addition to cash and term investments, the other main assets of the Club are:

- Debtors of \$13,187 (2020: \$9,370), the majority of which have been recovered as at the date of this report;
- Bar and ball inventory of \$11,260 (2020: \$8,227);
- ITF Work in Progress of \$65,208 (2020: \$59,998), as described further below; and
- Plant and equipment of \$25,974 (2020: \$1,667), the entire increase relating to the bar refurbishment.

Liabilities

In addition to the \$85,000 liability in respect of community trust funding received for the ITF, the Clubs only other liabilities are:

- Accrual and creditors of \$26,894 (2020: \$18,799), the majority of which relates to GST and PAYE which were due and paid in May;
- Employment emoluments of \$10,483 (2020: \$4,853), more than half of which were paid in May, with the balance relating to annual leave entitlements; and
- IRD Covid related cash flow loan of \$13,600, which the Board will look to repay within the two year interest free period.

Indoor Training Facility

The Board has been working on a major strategic project to convert an existing building adjacent to the clubrooms into an indoor training facility (the ITF). The current estimated cost for the construction and fitout is \$700k (excl. GST), including preparatory costs incurred to date. The Board has decided to account for the total cost of the ITF on the balance sheet as an asset in the period in which the project is completed. In the interim, all costs incurred on the project to date of \$65,208 have been recorded as Work in Progress.

Total funding of \$658,604 has been raised for the project to date, comprising of community trust approved funding of \$365,000, other fundraising activities of \$118,604 and Club committed reserves of \$175,000. \$280,000 of the community trust approved funding is held by the trust or in a solicitor's trust account until the project commences, the balance of \$85,000 is treated as a liability on the balance sheet. The Board continues to make grant applications to fund the remaining required funds for the project but is confident it has sufficient financial resources to commence the project.

The Board anticipates commencing the project within the next financial period, substantially reducing accumulated funds and cash reserves.

Final Comments

This is my fourth year as Treasurer for the Club and I thank the members for the trust they have placed in me over these years. It is an honour to work with a Board and organisation which is passionate about our Club's vision and seeks to maximise value from the funds we are entrusted with.

Over the past four years the Board has made positive progress on a number of long term strategic initiatives, while continuing to focus on improving service delivery. We have raised substantial funds for the ITF project and are seeking final approval from the Council to start the project, we have upgraded the Bar and Café area and improved trading revenue, we have successfully increased funding activities and secured essential cash reserves to protect future service delivery.

I would like to acknowledge my Board members who have shown huge commitment to serving the Club. And of course, my sincere thanks to our Club Manager, Ketan Patel, Wendy Verry and our many coaches and bar staff for the significant contribution they have made to the financial sustainability of the Club. I would also like to acknowledge the ongoing support from community trusts, as well as our special sponsors that so generously support the Club.

- the club manager's operational report, including membership and team matters, competitive results, outcomes of non-competitive programmes and risk management matters

Statement of Accounting Policies

For the Year ended 30 April 2021

Basis of Preparation

The Club has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000 for the last two annual reporting periods. This is the first year of its adoption. It previously prepared special purpose financial statements and the comparative numbers have not been restated. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the Club will continue to operate as a going concern in the foreseeable future.

Revenue

Revenue is accounted for as follows:

Subscription and Fee Income

Annual season member fees and subscriptions are recognised as revenue at the time of registration.

Where members purchase specific services (for example, attendance coaching and development programmes), revenue is recorded at the time of registration, with any refunds recorded as a reduction in revenue at the time a credit note is issued.

All other fee income is recorded as revenue when cash is received.

Fundraising and Grants

Fundraising and Grant income is accounted for depending on whether it has a "use or return" condition attached.

Where no use or return conditions are attached, the revenue is recorded as income when the cash is received. Where income includes a use or return condition, it is initially recorded as a liability on receipt. The income is then subsequently recognised within the Statement of Financial Performance as the performance conditions are met.

Donations

Donations are accounted for depending on whether they have been provided with a "use or return" condition attached or not. Where no use or return conditions are attached to the donation, revenue is recorded as income when the cash is received. Where donations include a use or return condition, the donation is initially recorded as a liability on receipt. The donation is subsequently recognised within the Statement of Financial Performance as the performance conditions are met.

The value of donated goods or services are recognised as donations or sponsorship income at the time of receipt. Where significant donated assets are received with useful lives of 12 months or more, and the fair value of the asset is readily obtainable, the donation is recorded at the value of the asset obtained. Donated assets with useful lives less than 12 months are expensed. Where the fair value of the asset or service is not readily obtainable, the donation is not recorded.

Interest and Investment Income

Interest income is recognised on a receipts basis.

Other Income

All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis and accounted for in accordance with the substance of the transaction.

Statement of Accounting Policies

For the Year ended 30 April 2021

Income Tax

The Club is a non-profit organisation, and accordingly not subject to income tax.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank and Cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

Debtors

Debtors are carried at estimated realisable value after providing against debts where collection is doubtful.

Inventory

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on a first in, first out basis.

Work in Progress

Costs incurred on capital expenditure projects are recorded as a Work in Progress asset until the period in which the project is completed, when accumulated costs are transferred to, and recognised as, property, plant, and equipment.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are shown at cost or valuation less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis on all property, plant and equipment, at rates that will write off the cost of the assets to their estimated residual values over their useful lives. The depreciation rates and useful lives associated with major classes of assets have been estimated as follows:

Furniture and fittings	4 to 10 years
Bar refurbishment	4 to 10 years
Computers and audio-visual equipment	2 to 5 years
Wicket covers	2 to 5 years
Bar appliances	4 to 10 years

Employee Costs

Employee entitlements are measured at undiscounted nominal values based on accrued entitlements at current rates of pay. These include salaries and wages accrued up to balance date, annual leave earned but not taken at balance date, and long service leave. The Club recognises a liability and an expense for bonuses it is contractually obliged to pay, or where a past event has created a constructive obligation.

Provisions

The Club recognises a provision for future expenditure of uncertain amount or timing when there is a present obligation (either legal or constructive) relating to a past event, from which the probability that an outflow of future economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and the ability to determine a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation both exist.

Statement of Accounting Policies

For the Year ended 30 April 2021

Loans

Loans are recognised when the amount borrowed has been received. The loan is recognised at the principal value plus accrued interest less repayments made.

Changes in Accounting Policies

The Club has elected to adopt PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) for the first time in this reporting period. This has resulted in the following accounting policy changes:

- Gear of \$1,000 is no longer recorded as a fixed asset, with the balance fully amortised in the current year.
- The total funds raised for the Indoor Training Facility that are not subject to use or return conditions are no longer accounted for as Deferred Income, with the balance of \$118,604 as of 30 April 2020 transferred directly to reserves.
- A provision for external net repair was established in a previous period in recognition of necessary repairs to the external nets. Although this requirement remains and cost estimates are consistent with the provision amount, these works have not yet been commissioned. This provision has been transferred directly to reserves, and a capital reserve of \$20,000 has been established to provide for this cost.

Note 3 – Indoor Training Facility Project

The Board is working on a substantial project to convert an existing building adjacent to the clubrooms into an indoor training facility (the **ITF**).

The Club has executed an agreement for the lease of the building adjacent to the clubrooms with the Council, with the intention of converting that building into the ITF. A deed of lease will be executed upon completion of the fitout and will be for an initial period of 10 years, with a right to renew for a further 10 years. After a rental holiday for the first 12 months, the rental payable during the initial period of the lease will be equal to 2.5% of the gross revenue generated by the Club from the ITF.

Architectural plans have been drawn up and building consent granted by the Council. Practec Limited has been appointed as the main contractor for the construction and fitout of the ITF, following a competitive tender process conducted in 2019.

The current estimated cost for the construction and fitout is \$702,494 (excl. GST), including preparatory costs incurred to date. This cost is lower than the original tendered price of \$970,442 (excl. GST), following a revision of the project scope to reduce the construction costs in line with available funding.

The Board has decided to account for the total cost of the ITF on the balance sheet as an asset in the period in which the project is completed. In the interim all costs incurred on the project continue to be recorded as Work in Progress.

As of 30 April 2021, the Club has sufficient committed funds and reserves to commence the construction of the project and is currently seeking approval from the Council, as landlord, to begin works. Funding for the project has been raised from the following sources.

Note 7 – Non-Current Liabilities

The Club applied for and received a Government Small Business Cashflow loan of \$13,600 on 8 June 2020. The key terms of the loan are:

- the loan is for a term of 5 years and the proceeds must only be used to pay for core operating costs (including, but not limited to, rent, insurance, utilities, supplier payments, or rates);
- interest accrues at the rate of 3% per annum, however no interest is payable if the loan is repaid in full by 8 June 2022; and
- interest and principal instalment payments must be made on a periodic basis, as notified by the IRD, from 8 June 2022 until the maturity date on 8 June 2025.

The Board will assess whether these funds are required for core operating costs beyond 8 June 2022, and if not, will repay the loan by that date to avoid incurring interest charges.

Note 9 – Commitments and rights to use

Commitment to lease and rights to use clubroom and park facilities

In 2013 Auckland Council (the **Council**) purchased the land at Merton Road, St Johns, known as Colin Maiden Park, from the University of Auckland. After this transaction the Club entered negotiations with the Council to protect the Club's position as concerns future use of the clubrooms and the park facilities, the latter which include artificial wickets and fixed practice nets constructed and paid for by the Club over the years.

An agreement was reached under which the Club transferred all its rights and interests in the artificial wicket and fixed practice net facilities to the Council in consideration for the Council granting to the Club a lease of the clubrooms and in recognition, in accordance with Council policy, of the Club's existing user rights to use those facilities now and in the future for the benefit of the Club's membership.

The lease of the clubrooms, effective from 1 February 2014, is for an initial period of 10 years (rent free) and with a right to renew for a further 10 years.
